On Sunday, the building will open at 12:00 p.m. During non-show days, the building will open at 12:00 p.m. Building will close daily at 9:00 p.m. Please note that there is a gate fee when entering the Putnam County Fairgrounds.
2. All entries must be in Harris Hall before entry time is over for each specified exhibit. Times are listed on page 4. No exhibit may be altered by the exhibitor once entry time has closed.
3. The Superintendent shall have the right to remove any entry, or part thereof, at any time
4. All entries will be released on Friday, July 30th from 6:00 p.m. – 9:00 p.m. and from 9:00 a.m. – 10:30 a.m. on Saturday, July 31st. **NO EXHIBITS WILL BE RELEASED EARLY. NO GARDEN OR OPEN-CONTAINER EDIBLE EXHIBITS WILL BE RELEASED TO EXHIBITORS.** Due to health concerns, all edibles will be disposed of.
5. Exhibiting is open to residents of Putnam County, Putnam County Extension Homemakers Club Members, Putnam County Master Gardener Members and parents of Putnam County 4-H members. Putnam County 4-H Members are encouraged to participate.
6. **Only one entry, per person, per class is permitted.** Children age 4 thru 2nd grade will enter exhibits in the Lil' Sprouts Program.
7. Judges are not required to award prizes to unworthy exhibits, whether or not there is competition.
8. An Overall Rookie Exhibitor award and Overall Harris Hall Exhibitor award are given out based on points earned by exhibiting in Harris Hall.
9. Harris Hall Awards will be presented virtually. The awards will be available for pick up when exhibits are released.

12. Participants are allowed to use mailing labels on entry tags to complete the address portion of the tag.
13. If you have any questions during fair, a Harris Hall Volunteer in a green apron will be happy to help. The Putnam County Master Gardeners serve as Harris Hall Volunteers/Hosts.
14. Prior to fair, questions can be directed to Purdue Extension at 765-653-8411.

Special Rules For 2021

1. All judging (except Lil' Sprouts) will be closed. Only approved volunteers, Extension staff, and the judge will be in the building during judging. Judging will be recorded and shared online. Judging will still take place shortly after entry time has ended.
2. We ask that all exhibits arrive ready to be displayed with minimal adjustments (placing in correct bottle or on correct plate) being made within the walls of Harris Hall.
3. Awards will be announced virtually.
4. Everything is subject to change as a result of needed safety precautions. Please check the Purdue Extension Putnam County website and/or the Putnam County Master Gardener Facebook page for the latest information.

SINGLE CUT FLOWER SPECIMENS

Coordinator – Beth Connell

All single cut flower specimen exhibits must be entered and in place on Saturday, July 24th from 8:00 a.m. – 11:00 a.m.

Judging will be closed for 2021. A recording will be made available online for individuals to view.

- A. “Cut specimen” means that the bloom has been severed from the parent plant with a section of stem and foliage attached. Stem length will vary in proportion to the size of the bloom and the nature of the plant. Stems are to be cut at an angle.
- B. Flowers are to be clean, fresh and free of pollen. Flowers are of one variety and are uniform in size.
- C. Containers will be provided for all entries.
- D. No foliage should be under water. Leaves should be clean, healthy and undamaged.
- E. Count to make sure you have the right number of blooms as specified in each category. **Remember to remove buds as specified; buds are considered another bloom.**
- F. No purchased flowers or greenery. All must be from home sources.
- G. ***Please include species and/or variety name on tag.***
- H. The first and second places in each major category will be considered for Champion and Reserve Champion, respectively.
 - I. A Champion and Reserve Champion ribbon will be awarded in each category.
 - J. An overall Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will be selected from the Champions and Reserve Champions.
 - K. An Overall Rookie Cut Flower Exhibitor award is given to the rookie exhibitor with the most cut flower points.

20. ROSE

Leave foliage on. Should be open 1/2 to 3/4 (should not be shown in bud stage.)

- a. Hybrid Tea or Grandiflora, Red, 1 bloom
- b. Hybrid Tea or Grandiflora, Pink or rose, 1 bloom
- c. Hybrid Tea or Grandiflora, Yellow, 1 bloom
- d. Hybrid Tea or Grandiflora, Orange, apricot, salmon or coral, 1 bloom

22. SPECIALTY CLASS

This class is limited to flowers NOT listed anywhere else that are suitable for drying. EXAMPLES – statice, strawflowers, yarrow, globe amaranthus, caspia, baby’s breath, etc. **Must Include Species Name.**

- a. 3 stems (NOT DRIED) all same variety, one or more colors
- b. 5 stems, (NOT DRIED) at least 3 varieties, one or more colors

5. HIWAYS AND BYWAYS

- a. LILIES OF THE FIELDS – Greenery and any lilies, **NO DAYLILIES.**
- b. ALL ROADS LEAD TO THE FAIR – Use cut plant materials gathered from the roadside or woods, such as wildflowers, weeds, leaves, mosses and grasses in your favorite container. If using a basket, it must have a handle.
- c. OVER AND OVER AGAIN – Three (3) or more types of perennial flowers and greenery in a container of your choice. Not over 24” in any direction.
- d. IN THE BEGINNING – Designed by a rookie (first time artistic arrangements exhibitor), using at least three colors of flowers with suitable greenery.
- e. NOW AND THEN – Container must be a recycled or repurposed item. Not over 24” in any direction.
