How To Give A Dog A Bath

Tools Needed

Important Facts

- Never get soap in Dog eye or ear
- Bathe Your Dog once a month
- Make sure to get the Soap all out of there fur so they dont have irritated skin or dry spots.

Step 1. Brush your Dog before the Bath
matted hair holds water leaving
your dog with irritated skin

Step 2. Use lukewarm water

Step 3. Talk to your pet in a calm
reassuring voice

Step 4. Use dog Shampoo

Step 5. Rinse Well

Step 6. Air dry or dab with towel softly

Step 7. Reward your dog

Exterior Parasites

Fleas
Fleas live by consuming blood, or hematophagy, from their hosts.



Ringworm
A highly contagious, fungal infection of the skin or scalp.



Ticks
Ticks are arachnids, typically 3 to 5 mm long, part of the superorder Parasitiformes.



Lice
A head lice infestation results from the direct transfer of lice from the hair of one person to the hair of another through head-to-head contact.



Ear mites
Ear mites are mites that live in the ears of animals and humans. The most commonly seen species in veterinary medicine is *Otodectes cynotis*.

Allergy Detection Dogs
Allergy detection dogs are trained to sniff out and alert their handler to the scent of things that they are allergic to. This helps their handlers have a greater sense of independence and security.

Seeing Eye Dog
A seeing eye dog is trained to help the blind or visually impaired. All seeing eye dogs will help the blind cross the road, go on walks, go to the store, visit family and much more.
Not all seeing eye dogs wear service vests which is not required for seeing eye dogs as many are made with special harnesses that have handles.

Autism Support Dog
Autism support dogs are trained to help people (mostly kids) on the autism spectrum, by reducing isolation and comforting them in stressful times, or when they become over stimulated. They also help keep them from running away or track them if they do run off.

Hearing dog
A hearing dog assists hearing impaired people by alerting them to noises such as alarms, doorbells, crying babies, etc. when they hear a noise they touch their human and lead them toward the noise.

Diabetic Alert Dog
Diabetic alert dogs are trained to detect when a person's sugars are too high or too low and alert them before it becomes dangerous.

Mobility Assistance Dog
Mobility assistance dogs are trained to help those in wheelchairs, spinal injuries, brain injuries, and amputees, such as helping them retrieve, pressing buttons, serving as a brace, or pulling a wheelchair up a ramp.

Diabetic Alert & Detection Dog
These alert & response dogs are trained to react to specific signs of behavior that usually happen right before a person has a seizure. They will bark but only, get the person to a safe place or position, or bring them water, if please etc.

FASD Service Dog
These dogs support children who have been exposed to alcohol prenatally, and have been diagnosed as fetal alcohol spectrum disorders. They help with physical and mental difficulties, behavioral issues, as well as learning disabilities mostly by interrupting repetitive behavior.

Psychiatric Service Dog
These types of dogs assist people who suffer from things like depression, anxiety, and post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) by creating a physical barrier between their person and other people creating more space and by just giving them comfort by being there.

Dog Training:

When working with a variety of learning styles, dog training also involves teaching people to train their dogs. You can contact the Certification Council for Professional Dog Trainers and the Association of Pet Dog Trainers for information on how to get some certification for this job field, even though no federal or state certification is required to be a dog trainer.

In the dog training field, there are so many different kinds of training you could do. To start with, there are jobs that train dogs to be aids for their handler, whether that be for autism, diabetic, or PTSD. Secondly dogs that have training correspondent to their job are an asset to the Governmental Branches, Fire Departments, and Police. Finally, you can train dogs to act for commercials, TV shows, and movies.



Different Types of Career Fields Working with Dogs



What To Know for Working in the Dog Career Field:

With there being a broad variety of careers working with dogs, it is much necessary that those going into those careers (e.g. Veterinary Technicians, Groomers, Pet Sitters, and Dog Daycare Staff) to study Canine Training & Behavioral enrichment which involves using positive reinforcement to shape desired behaviors, and the structuring of an animal's environment to provide choices and promote natural behaviors.



Dog Grooming & Doggie Daycare:

If you are looking into Dog Grooming you would need to seek learning from the National Dog Grooming Association of America (NDGAA). This ensures that each groomer has experience with not only grooming, but maintenance and animal safety as well. To illustrate, experienced groomers occasionally cut below the fur, but someone without the training can do much, much worse. Moreover, it is not optimal that a grooming facility has dirty cages and no one is cleaning and sweeping when needed. Additionally, you want to make sure a groomer doesn't do anything with tranquilizers as an option if your dog is stressed and not staying still. This approach should be performed only when necessary and under the advice of a veterinarian.

Putting your dog to a fun-filled doggie daycare will ensure regular exercise to maintain a healthy weight, behavior relief, socialization with dogs and people, happiness, making separation anxiety and destructive behavior at home lessened.
