

# FASHION REVUE

(Last updated 12/2020)

**State Fair Exhibit:** Advanced Divisions Only (Grades 8-12). Each county can send six (6) participants to the state 4-H fashion revue (maximum two (2) per category).

## **Terms & Conditions:**

1. All 4-H sewing members are encouraged to participate in the Fashion Revue.
2. Garments modeled must have been made by participants since the previous county 4-H exhibit.
3. Sewing members will receive notification of time, date, and place of judging.
4. An outfit is a garment or garments that when put together make a complete look – such as 1- or 2-piece dress, or 1- or 2-piece pant suit, or a 3-piece combination, such as pants, vest, and blouse or shirt.
5. Handcrafted garments made in the 4-H craft projects may be modeled in 4-H Fashion Revue whenever the finished garment(s) meet the requirements of a fashion revue classification.
6. Age groups: Junior participants (Grades 3-7) are judged by grade, Senior participants (Grades 8-12) are judged by category.
7. Winners in each classification will be selected.
8. Junior members may enter only the one division they are completing in clothing construction. Garment(s) worn by junior entrants must be the same that is/are being entered for construction judging.
9. Senior members may enter as many classifications as they desire at Fashion Revue judging at the county level.
10. Senior Fashion Revue will be judged by classifications and members may enter as many garments as they wish, but only one per category. Enter in the appropriate category for the garment to be modeled.
11. All garments modeled and judged in Fashion Revue must also be judged as sewing exhibits to ensure the garment(s) meet the required skills.
12. Entries must model in the same category as they exhibit in construction.
13. Outfits to be worn in the state 4-H fashion revue cannot be exhibited in any other state 4-H exhibit section.

## **Senior Categories:**

- **Informal or Casual Wear:** A complete outfit of one or two pieces suitable for school, weekend, or casual informal activities.
- **Dress Up Wear:** This is suitable for special, church or social occasions which are not considered to be formal. It may be an outfit of one or more pieces with or without its own costume coat or jacket (lined or unlined). This is not an outfit which would be worn to school.
- **Free Choice:** These are garments which do not fit in the other classifications. Examples include: tennis wear, swim wear or other active sportswear; lounge wear; riding habits; historic, dance, theatrical, or international costumes; & unlined coats.
- **Suit or Coat:** The suit consists of two pieces including a skirt or pants and its own lined jacket. It is not a dress with jacket as in “dress wear”. The coat is a separate lined coat for your wardrobe. It will be judged separately as a coat with its own accessories.
- **Separates:** Consists of three garments which must be worn as a coordinated complete outfit. Each piece should be versatile enough to be worn with other garments in your wardrobe.

- **Formal Wear:** This outfit may be one or more pieces suitable for any formal occasion such as proms, weddings, and formal functions.

**DEFINITION OF AN OUTFIT:** An outfit is a garment or garments that when put together make a complete look – such as one- or two-piece dress, or one- or two-piece pant suit, or a three-piece combination, such as pants, vest, and blouse or shirt.

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
